LENT

This liturgical year the Season of Lent begins with ashes on Wednesday, March 1, 2017, and climaxes with Mass on Holy Thursday, April 13, 2017. Lent is the Church's forty-day (the six Sundays are not counted) spiritual pilgrimage toward Easter. Christ Himself prayed and fasted for forty days and forty nights in the desert before He entered His public ministry, and in Lent we imitate Christ's days of prayer and fasting in preparation for our redemption.

Originally, the period before Easter was a time of study and prayer for those preparing to be baptized at the Easter Vigil. Today, the Church invites us not only to pray for catechumens but also to renew our own commitment to the life that began in us at Baptism. We observe Lent as a season of spiritual development marked by prayer, penance, fasting, charity, and introspection as we seek to recognize and respond afresh to God's presence in our lives. We enter Lent with the hope that Christ will become more meaningful to us and that we will be more Christ-like to others.

The Conversion of St. Paul

St. Paul, known as ‘the Apostle to the Gentiles’, was born in the city of Tarsus, a Roman city, thereby giving him Roman citizenship. At a young age his parents sent him to Jerusalem to be instructed in the Mosaic Law under the greatest Rabbi of his time, Gamaliel.

Saul was an excellent student and as a Pharisee was respected for his great intellect and zeal for the Jewish faith and traditions. Because the Jews had a rule that their children should learn a trade along with their studies, Saul learned to make tents. This is a trade that provided him with the finances he needed later in his life to travel and evangelize. Because of Saul’s great zeal for Jewish law and traditions, he was very upset about his Jewish brethren who were following the ‘New Way’, as Christianity was first called. So, thinking that he was serving God, Saul became the worst enemy of Christians. He hunted them down and dragged them out of their homes, imprisoning them and even having them killed. In fact, Saul was a witness to the stoning of the first Christian martyr, St. Stephen. Because Saul was a leader, he stood by and watched as those stoning Stephen laid their cloaks at his feet. It’s very likely that Saul ordered Stephen to be stoned.

Saint Luke’s recording of this story in his book of Acts is not merely a historical account. While drawing his last breath, Stephen called out to God to forgive those that were stoning him. St. Augustine later declared that had Stephen not prayed at that moment, the Church would never have had the great Apostle Paul. For it was Stephen’s prayer that planted the seed in which later helped Saul on his path to conversion.

As most of you know, Saul’s conversion occurred when he was on his way to the city of Damascus. He had gone to the high priest and the Sanhedrin for a commission to allow him to go where he knew there were many new Christians, to arrest them and take them back to Jerusalem for trial. The journey to Damascus took about two days by horseback. When he and his men were very near the city, they were suddenly surrounded by a light so bright that it knocked Saul to the ground. The account of what happened is written in the book of Acts, chapter 9. “They heard a voice from heaven that said: ‘Saul, Saul, why do you persecute Me?’ And Saul said, ‘Who are you, Lord?’ And He said, ‘I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting; but rise and enter the city, and you will be told what you are to do.’ The men who were traveling with him stood speechless, hearing the voice but seeing no one. Saul arose from the ground and when his eyes were opened he could see nothing; so they led him by the hand and brought him into Damascus.

“For three days he was without sight and neither ate nor drank. There was a disciple there named Ananias. The Lord said to him in a vision, ‘Ananias.’ And he said, ‘Here I am, Lord.’ And the Lord said to him, ‘Rise and go to the street called Straight, and inquire in the house of Judas for a man of Tarsus named Saul; for behold, he is praying. And he has seen a man named Ananias come in and lay his hands on him so that he might regain his sight.’ But Ananias answered, ‘Lord, I have heard from many about this man and how much evil he has done to thy saints at Jerusalem; and here he has authority from the chief priests to bind all who call upon thy name.’ But the Lord said to him, ‘Go, for he is a chosen instrument of Mine to carry My name before the Gentiles and kings and the sons of Israel; for I will show him how much he must suffer for the sake of My name.’” So Ananias departed and entered the house. And laying his hands on him he said, ‘Brother Saul, the Lord Jesus who appeared to you on the road by which you came has sent me that you may regain your sight and be filled with the Holy Spirit.’ And immediately, something like scales fell from his eyes and he regained his sight.

Then he rose and was baptized, and took food and was strengthened.” From that time forth, Saul went on to preach about Christ. Because he was so well-known as a Pharisee and was now evangelizing for Christ, Saul began being persecuted by his Jewish brethren in the same way he had been persecuting the Christians. At some point he decided to start using his Roman name, Paul.

After spending some time with the disciples of Christ in Damascus, God called Paul to Arabia where he spent at least two years in the desert. It is believed that this is where Paul had visions much like the vision St. John writes about in his book of Revelation. The Lord prepared Paul to teach the Gospel, and when Paul returned from the desert, after a short stay in Damascus, he went directly to Jerusalem where he met with Peter, our first pope, and some of the other Apostles, to receive Peter’s blessing before he started on his ministry. Paul spent the rest of his life traveling and spreading the Gospel of Jesus, establishing churches and teaching others to lead in his absence. Paul’s epistles to the churches that he established make up over one-fourth of the New Testament. He truly is the greatest missionary in Church history.

There is much we can learn from the conversion of St. Paul. One lesson is that we should NEVER judge others. St. Paul, the worst enemy of the early Christians, would seem to be the most unlikely convert to the Church. But God had a plan for Saul, just as He does for each of us. We never know how some small thing that we may say or do will affect another person. When Paul watched Stephen die a holy death, praying for his persecutors, it had to have an impact on him. And Stephen’s prayer was heard by God. The seed that Stephen planted by his Christian forgiveness of his enemies helped in the conversion of St. Paul. We are all called to be evangelists, to plant seeds of faith wherever we can — in our families and our work places. We never know when something we do or say might transform another or even bring a great saint and missionary to the Church like St. Paul.

Prayer

Dear Lord Jesus, we thank you for St. Paul and his tremendous witness in the early Church that is still impacting us today. We pray that You will bring others into today’s Church — our separated brethren, who like Paul are so often misguided, and also like St. Paul are zealous in their persecution of Catholics. We pray that You will bring them back to the one fold and that through their zeal for the faith, millions will come to the fullness of Truth. In Your holy name we pray. Amen.

Reminder

Since February 1, 1902, when the original charter of the Knights of Columbus was issued in the Territory of New Mexico, the NM Knights have sought to support our Church and assist those in need. Over the last five years, through the efforts of our local councils, the Knights of Columbus in New Mexico has donated more than 3.2 million dollars for the needs of our parishes and communities. In addition, over this same time NM Knights have provided over 2.2 million volunteer hours. This brings our charitable contribution of time and treasure over the last five years, to more than 54 million dollars in value. To continue expanding this tradition we have overhauled the NMSC Annual Charity Raffle with changes that will allow all councils the ability to earn even greater profits for their charitable projects: Providing \$10,000 in prizes, including a \$5,000 Grand Prize and five \$1,000 prizes. Tickets are priced competitively at \$5 each. Additionally, the following council incentives are being offered: ·The council that sells the Grand Prize Ticket receives \$1,000. ·The council that sells the most tickets receives \$1,000. ·The council that sells the most tickets per member receives \$1,000. While this revamped fundraiser has the potential to become a Million-Dollar Raffle, we have set a modest goal of \$100,000 in gross ticket sales statewide this year. While at first glance this goal may seem like a mammoth task, when spread across our jurisdiction's membership, this target comes out to just over two tickets per member—a most achievable goal. The ticket split remains at 50% for the council so that it can make donations to the local charities of their choice. The other 50% will go to the state organization to cover raffle administration costs, legal requirements and prizes. The remaining balance goes to funding charitable needs at the state level.

Did You Know?

Emblem of Order



The emblem of the Order dates from the second Supreme Council meeting, held May 12, 1883. It was designed by then-Supreme Knight James T. Mullen. The emblem is composed of a shield mounted upon the Formée Cross. The shield is associated with medieval knights. The Formée Cross is a traditional artistic design of the Cross of Christ and represents the Catholic spirit of the Order. Mounted on the shield is a vertically standing fasces with an anchor and short sword crossed behind it. The fasces dates from the Roman Empire and is symbolic of authority, which must exist in any tightly bonded and efficiently operating organization. The anchor is the mariner's symbol, symbolic of Columbus, patron of the Order. The short sword was the weapon of the knight when engaged upon errands of mercy. Together with the shield and the letters K of C, these symbols express Catholic knighthood in organized, merciful action. The colors of red, white and blue in the background of the shield and the foreground of the Formée Cross are colors that represent noble aspects of the Order. Red is symbolic of stout-hearted courage, of pulsing activity and a full measure of devotion. Blue is symbolic of hope, of calm tranquility under God and of confidence in the protection of one's country. White is symbolic of nobility of purpose, of purity of aim and of crucible-tried ideals to be carried out.

There are also ecclesiastical symbolism for the colors red, white and blue. Red is symbolic of Christ's redemptive blood, shed upon Calvary, and of the martyrs' blood, shed in defense of faith. Red is the symbol of faith, belief in Christ, redemption and knowledge of the love of Jesus Christ. White is symbolic of the Eucharistic host, pledge of God's Eucharistic presence among men, the infinite love God has for man and the overwhelming affection which God has for each individual. White is symbolic of Christ-like charity. Blue is symbolic of Our Lady's mantle, in which she wrapped her beloved Son, through whom came salvation to a sinful world. Blue is the symbol of hope.

Major pro-life bills to be heard

Thursday, March 2, 2017, 1:30PM at NM Capitol.

Plan on attending the public hearings for these bills [this Thursday](#):

HB 37, Infant Born Alive Protection Act: Currently, infants who survive late-term abortions at 24 weeks and beyond in New Mexico are left to die or without basic care like a warm blanket. HB 37 would require infants who survive abortions are given palliative (comfort) care or medical care, if necessary. According to the CDC, there are over 500 cases of infants surviving abortions across the country. The UNM chief abortionist, Dr. Eve Espey admits "OB-GYNs do not resuscitate neonates" showing signs of life after late-term abortions at UNM Hospital.

HB 220, Late Term Abortion Ban (House version): Abortion is legal up to the day of birth in NM - for ANY reason. New Mexico has the highest rate of late-term abortions in the nation. Late-term abortion is dangerous for women, inhumane and involves excruciating pain for infants. After 24 weeks, an infant in utero is given an intra cardiac injection-- *a process deemed inhumane and cruel for exterminating animals by NM statute.*
